Topic: Descriptive Text - Historical Buildings

Grade: 10

Objective: Students will learn about the Statue of Liberty by reading a text and answering reading comprehension, grammar and vocabulary questions.

Materials: Papers with Statue of Liberty reading, Jeopardy point cards, Whiteboard, whiteboard marker

Warm-Up: Think-Pair-Share (5-6 minutes)

• Students will look at a picture of the Statue of Liberty (but don't tell them what it is). Then, individually they will think of how to describe the statue for 1 minute. Next, students will pair up and talk about how they described the statue for 2 minutes. Have some students volunteer to share their descriptions (2-3 minutes).

Lesson: Descriptive Text (25 minutes)

- Explain the general structure of a descriptive text and what to include when describing historical buildings
- Can ask the students to give examples of historical buildings in their country and around the world
- Use one of the local buildings as an example

Main Activity: Jeopardy (45 minutes)

- 1. Divide students into teams made up of 3-4 students
- 2. Give each team a descriptive text about the Statue of Liberty
- 3. Allow the students to read/skim over the text (10 minutes)
 - a. While they do this, stick the cards for jeopardy on the wall or draw out on the whiteboard (if you have access to a projector and reliable electricity, this is also an option)
- 4. The first team starts and chooses a category (reading comprehension, grammar or vocabulary) and an amount
- 5. Read the question
 - a. If the team answers correctly, they get those points
 - b. If they answer incorrectly, put the question back and move on to the next team
- 6. The next team can choose the same question or a new one
- 7. The game ends after a set amount of rounds or when there are no questions left. The winner is the team that has the most points
- 8. Optional: Give the winning team oleh oleh (reward)

Closing/Review: Rapid Fire (10 minutes)

- 1. Have the students stand up
- 2. Point to a student and ask them a question about descriptive text and the Statue of Liberty reading
- 3. If the student doesn't answer quickly, point to another student and ask the same question
 - a. Later, you can ask the same student who answered the question incorrectly first the same question again to make sure they know the right answer
- 4. Keep doing this until only one student is left standing
 - a. Can give the winner oleh oleh
